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# **Summer in Rwanda**



## Visa Information and Budgeting

#### **Travel Documents**

#### **Passports**

You should apply as early as possible before departure to secure your passport through a Passport Agency (found in major cities), a local issuing office, a Federal or State Court House, or a Class I Post Office. Start the process early so that there will be plenty of time to resolve any problems that may arise. If you will be using your current passport, make sure that it is good for six months after your return to the U.S. If it is not, you will need to renew it.

#### Visa

All visitors to Rwanda who are not Rwandan citizens will need a visa to enter the country. US citizens: obtain visa before traveling or a 30-day tourist visa at port of entry for \$30. Credit cards are not accepted at all land border crossings. Visit travel.state.gov for more information on requirements for Rwanda. #### **Budget**

Your budget for incidental expenses will depend on your personal taste/extravagance and the amount of independent travel you intend to do before or after the program. The program fee covers most of your necessary expenses: tuition, housing, meals, and transportation and entrance fees for program excursions. You are responsible for your round trip airfare to Adelaide, incidentals, laundry, personal expenditures and any additional travel. Entertainment, travel and incidentals during the weeks of the program may vary greatly with individual tastes. You should expect to budget around one and a half times the amount you normally spend at home per week, or roughly \$175-\$225 per week, keeping in mind that expenditures will depend largely on your own spending habits and plans to travel.



## **Traveling to Rwanda**

NOTE: You are responsible for your own travel arrangements to and from Rwanda

#### Airport Pick-Up

You are responsible for your flight arrangements to and from Rwanda. Your accommodations will be available from May 24. The Program Directors will contact students later about specific arrival times and airport pick-up plans. This means for most students, leaving the US on May 22 or 23 (depending on the length and location of your layover) in order to arrive on the 13<sup>th</sup> (you lose a day crossing the International Dateline). Please carefully check your flight itinerary before purchase to ensure that you are arriving on the 24<sup>th</sup>. The program officially ends June 7<sup>th</sup> (i.e., you will need to leave by that date or make arrangements for your own housing for that night and beyond). Please notify the Program Directors immediately if your travel plans change or your flights unexpectedly change.

<u>From the Airport to your housing</u>: Students will be met at Rwanda airport by the Program Directors and our partners at Aegis Trust who will arrange for transportation to the hostel.

Please be aware that you will not be able to find a direct flight from the US to Rwanda and that your plans are likely to involve two if not three layovers. Be sure that you have entered your complete flight into the GEO's application portal so that those waiting for you in Rwanda may be able to check on any potential delays that you may have incurred along the way. Also, dress comfortably for the long hauls, and make sure to move around periodically during your trans-oceanic flight.

#### **Immigration**

Give yourself at least 2 hours to go through Customs and Immigration in Rwanda (and maybe 3 hours to allow time to get to your connecting flight because of a change in airport). You will probably have free time, but every so often the lines are incredibly long and slow. Once you check your bags in the States (even if you are flying to make a connection before you fly to Rwanda), you will not have to retrieve your bag until you disembark the plane in Rwanda. Of course, always check this policy before you go. On your flight, you will be given an arrival form to fill out and give to customs; make sure you have the address of your accommodation in Rwanda handy, as you will need it to fill out the form.

Once in Kigali, you will have to pass through customs. This can be stressful, but here's a step-by-step guide of how the process works:

- Disembark the plane and proceed through passport control. Don't worry
  about missing it, everyone from your flight will be heading to the same place.
  This is where you get your visa checked out and your passport stamped. They
  will look at your arrival form and mark it if necessary. Remember that you are
  not coming to study in Rwanda (like you would be if coming for a full semester
  or year abroad) but rather you are coming on a study trip from your university
  in the United States.
- Collect your bags at baggage claim. You MUST have your bags to pass through customs and to recheck on the other side.
- Move to customs. They may ask you a few questions (e.g., "Do you have any fresh fruit?"), then will check and collect your arrival form.

## Coursework

You will receive information on what materials you will need at your program orientation. Be sure that you arrange to purchase your textbooks and other materials (if applicable) before you leave the campus at the end of the Spring Semester. Plan to read as many of your texts as possible before you leave the United States consistent with an individual professor's instructions. Check with the professor of your courses for his/her particular suggestions.

During your stay in Kigali, the majority of your course will take place at:

# **Kigali Genocide Memorial Centre**

The Kigali Genocide Memorial is managed and run by Aegis Trust on behalf of the National Commission for the Fight Against Genocide (CNLG). This is a visitor center for students and visitors who wish to better understand the events of the 1994 genocide. The remains of nearly 250,000 people are interred here. The Center is located in Gisozi, 10 minutes from the center of Kigali.





## **Excursions & Activities**

#### Official and Personal Travel Options

The Rwanda program will include local field trips to locations that relate directly to these fields of study, such as visits to the Akagera National Park. Overnight excursions may include Volcanoes National Park, a park in the northwestern part of the country and a known haven for mountain gorilla and golden monkeys, and Lake Kivu, one of the African Great Lakes boarded by Volcanoes National Park.



## Living in Rwanda

#### Housing

Students will be housed at Aegis Trust's local student hostel. The hostel is dormitory style housing and will be separated by gender. Each bunk will have their own mosquito net. Students should bring their own towel. We recommend a quick dry micro-fiber towel so as it is easy to dry and clean. There are no laundry facilities on site, however there are cleaners that come in periodically that will clean your laundry if you wish (this will cost an extra fee not covered by the program). You can also opt to do hand laundry and bring Woolite.



#### **Meals**

All meals will be provided by Aegis Trust or on excursion location. The dorms are located a few minutes' drive from the center of the city, however there are some restaurants nearby if students wish to find a coffee or snack.



## Communication

The GEO provides local cell phones for all students on William & Mary summer programs with *homestays*. Students that are not participating in a program with a homestay are responsible for researching and arranging their communication plan.

## **Health & Safety**

#### **Immunization**

- Most travelers to Rwanda get vaccines/medication for Hepatitis A,
   Typhoid, and Malaria. Some travelers also get Hepatitis B, Rabies and
   Yellow Fever. You are encouraged to consult the Center for Disease
   Control to verify which vaccinations are recommended for prolonged stay
   in Rwanda:

#### Medications

Please remember that, while abroad, it is advisable to consistently follow
your doctor's specific medication instructions and continue taking any
medications you are prescribed. Any changes to medication levels should
only be undertaken in direct consultation with the prescribing doctor.
While travel abroad always has the potential to influence changes, good
or bad, in your physical and mental health, do not assume that temporary
variations in your condition are indicative of longer lasting changes. If you
feel that an alteration in any prescribed medication levels may be
warranted, consult a medical professional before making any changes.

# **Travel & Country Information**

We encourage all students to research their study abroad destination. The State Department has important information available online. Be sure to read up on Rwandan history, culture, and current events before your arrival, as well. Knowing as much as possible about where you are going will not only make you more comfortable during your time in the country, but will also allow you to talk more knowledgeably with your new friends and teachers.

## Kigali

Kigali is the modern capital city located near the center of Rwanda. The city is spread across numerous hills that surround the area, filled with unique neighborhoods with local bars, cafes, and restaurants. Kigali is noticeably clean, particularly due to the fact that plastic bags are banned in the city. This is also due to *Umuganda*, a weekly service that typically takes place on the last Saturday of the month where community members get together to keep the streets clean. Although Kigali does not experience a significant number of visitors each year, you will likely be greeted with a warm welcome from the locals, so take time to explore the city.
